Kyle recently visited Washington, D.C. and was fascinated by the Smithsonian Museums. Kyle's teacher asked him to write an informational passage on the Smithsonian. The Smithsonian

- (1) The Smithsonian Museum is located in Washington, D.C. and is a national treasure. (2) Because it is the world's largest museum, people travel from all over the world to visit and experience what it has to offer. (3) The Smithsonian is comprised of 19 museums and art galleries to explore, as well as gardens and the National Zoological Park. (4) Some of the different museums include the African Art Museum, the Air and Space Museum, the American Indian Museum, and the Natural History Museum. (5) The Smithsonian was established in 1846. (6) James Smithson, a British scientist, left his estate to the United States, allowing for the establishment of the Smithsonian Institute.
- (7) During our visit to the Smithsonian, they first stopped at the National Air and Space Museum, which has 23 galleries showing hundreds of aircraft, spacecraft, missiles, and rockets. (8) The galleries even house the 1903 Wright Flyer and had the Apollo 11 command module on display. (9) In addition, there are flight simulations and an "ask the expert" lecture series. (10) One fascinating exhibit is called "Moving Beyond Earth." (11) It looks at the achievements and challenges of human spaceflight in the United States during the space shuttle and space station era.
- (12) The Natural History Museum, which has an IMAX, a Butterfly Pavilion, and even live tarantula feedings, was next on our list. (13) It contains exhibits, everything from the Human Genome Project, to life in ancient Egypt, to gems, geology, and minerals. (14) In addition, there are exhibits on the earliest human origins, the development of world cultures, and dinosaurs. (15) These exhibits are among the museum's most popular.



- (16) I loved visiting our next stop, the national zoo, which houses giant pandas, Asian elephants, Sumatran tigers, and cheetahs. (17) The zoo even puts on an elephant training demonstration. (18) There is also a child-friendly exhibit which introduces children to farm animals at the barn, where visitors get a chance to see how animals are housed and cared for. (19) Visitors are introduced to and encouraged to interact with goats, miniature donkeys, and cows. (20) Another cool feature of the National Zoo is the Reptile Discovery Center, which houses over 70 species, including snakes, frogs, turtles, lizards, crocodiles, and Komodo dragons.
- (21) Along with all of these historical exhibits, gardens, and zoos, there are also several art galleries to see at the Smithsonian, such as the Freer Gallery of Art. (22) Another noteworthy museum is the National Portrait Gallery, in which you will find the "America's Presidents" exhibit. (23) No matter what your interests were, you can always find something fascinating at the Smithsonian.

V is for Volunteer

- Today, a growing number of students are being asked to become more involved in their communities. In response, many communities are partnering with schools to make sure that students are matched with the right kind of volunteering opportunities. These efforts not only help students meet community service requirements, but more importantly they can lead to an ongoing commitment to volunteer service for the rest of a student's life. Volunteering can be beneficial in a multitude of ways, not just for the people receiving the help, but also for the volunteers.
- The desire to be of service to others is probably the most common reason people volunteer. For many volunteers, the act of sharing their time and talents is freeing. When they give their time or skills, it allows them to help others in a way that they might not be able to do in a regular job or at school. Most volunteers choose to do so because they believe that their efforts—no matter how small—make a lasting difference in the lives of others. Imagine how grateful you would feel if complete strangers volunteered their own free time just to help you.
- Volunteering also broadens an individual's worldview. Working with others from different economic and cultural backgrounds allows people to see new viewpoints and understand differing perspectives. Volunteering is all about education because an individual has numerous opportunities to learn about others. The fact is, sometimes, it takes viewing the world through another's eyes to appreciate the abundance that is present in our own lives or to see that more than one solution might exist to solve a problem.
- Volunteers usually start out by choosing a field that they are already interested in or have background knowledge about. Volunteers at animal shelters are there because they love animals. Literacy volunteers offer their time to help others develop a love of literature and reading because they know that the ability to read well opens so many doors of opportunity for the people they are teaching. Those that enjoy cooking put their culinary skills to work in food pantries or homeless shelters. Technology professionals can teach basic computer skills to those in need. This can have a lasting impact by possibly helping them to be more independent in using technology, whether searching for a better job or writing a research paper for college. Volunteers help register voters or work the polls on Election Day. It is through their efforts that our democracy functions.
- 5 Studies have been done to understand the impact of volunteering on people. The studies show that these activities can dramatically shape a person's life. People who volunteer frequently report experiencing a new awareness of their world. They see that their efforts can help make a difference. This is especially important for young people who sometimes feel discouraged that their work is not



meaningful. Many great movements began as volunteer movements and later went on to help shape national policy. The environmental movement is a good example of this, as well as many volunteer efforts to help protect endangered animals.

For many volunteers today, providing assistance to others is a way to push back against what they perceive as a growing disconnect from each other in our society. Our increased reliance on technology and our gadgets has ignited social isolation from community. Volunteering re-establishes that human connection that all of us need.
